
May Wong with Miss Darcy at Henry Root, London. Photo by Ursula Roxy Aitchison (www.ursularoxy.uk)

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in Knightsbridge (Princess Diana's favourite eaterie). We got talking and discovered he'd be delighted if we brought Darcy to eat at his restaurant, too. He now has his own Cockapoo, Coco, who welcomes all the guests from her sofa! Lucio's restaurant is very smart, with white table cloths and the best food, and it is dog-friendly every day of the week."

Thrilled by this discovery, May started asking elsewhere and has been overjoyed to find another five dog-friendly places in the same road.

Miss Darcy doesn't just eat out in London; she is a trailblazing international doggie jet-setter.

"Germany is by far the most dog-friendly place we've visited; even the smartest, trendiest restaurants in Berlin expect you to bring your dog with you, it's normal. I started writing a blog to encourage others that you can

spend time with your dogs - you can travel with them in comfort and eat with them. You don't have to be apart.

"Dogs want to share their lives with us and I know I'm happier when I am with my dogs. I hope I have shown others how to do it."
